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President's Message

Grassroots Making the Difference

Recent election results have frustrated many of us in public education over the past seven or eight years. Whether it be



your local school board, state senator, state representative, or the governor, it seems as though the bulk of the laws and state mandates have made our professional lives more difficult. Some of the

challenges include reduced state funding, OTES, attempts at privatization, resident educator requirements, and an overabundance of state testing. One can argue these examples do not enhance the day-to-day education of a student. In fact, it can be argued that these are distractions that dilute the educational process. Some locals across the state were frustrated to the point where the local decided to create

positive change at the most basic level—their individual Board of Education. As President of the Parma Education Association (PEA), this is exactly the task our membership desired.

On May 26, 2015, the Parma City School District's Board of Education voted 5-0 to impose a contract upon the members of PEA. The bargaining process was difficult and lasted nearly 2-1/2 years from 2013 to 2015. During that time, the administration did the typical divide-and-conquer which included blaming PEA for the lack of progress. PEA leadership recognized the division in the Association and took advantage of an offer from OEA to help conduct a listening tour of all 15 buildings in Parma from late 2014 to early 2015. Approximately 500 conversations were conducted with PEA members and the data was compiled.

After the contract was imposed the PEA membership had a difficult decision to

make. The PEA membership chose to work under the imposed contract in lieu of striking. Moving forward, based on the data from the listening tour, it was clear that the PEA membership wanted three things from their Association: (1) communicate more effectively with the members, (2) engage the community in a positive manner, and (3) have a better working relationship with the Board of Education. PEA leadership promised the membership that they would work to accomplish all three requests. However, in order to work with the school board more effectively, PEA promised its members they would attempt to seek, endorse, and elect three pro-public education candidates to the Board of Education in 2017. Over the course of the next two years, PEA attempted to earn the trust of its members by accomplishing the three goals set forth by the membership in the listening tour.

Phase One: Communication. (1) PEA members receive regular updates via email from the President. (2) Building reps hold regular 10-minute meetings in the home school following PEA meetings. (3) Organize events for new educators. (4) Created PEA Facebook page called "PEA Community" which launched PEA's new logo and highlights positive accomplishments of PEA members and the teaching profession.

Phase Two: Community. (1) PEA conducted a series of community focus groups. (2) Organized a rally for public education in May 2017. Rallies were held in front of all 15 buildings before school, and educators walked in their buildings together. (3) Participated in the 2017 Parma Independence Day parade. (4) PEA had a table at the 2017 PCSD Back to School kickoff event. (5) Attended the Labor Day Festival in Parma at James Day Park. (6) Publicized PEA's annual Thanksgiving food drive which feeds approximately 70 needy families.

Phase Three: School Board. (1) In April 2016 at a combined meeting of Executive Committee members and building representatives, OEA's Dan Ramos facilitated a power mapping activity that identified the qualities PEA wanted a Board of Education candidate to possess. (2) PEA leadership established relationships with the individuals as defined by the power mapping. (3) In early 2017, Dan Ramos and PEA developed a timeline through Election Day, November 7, 2017. (4) PEA invited OAPSE leaders to join the process in spring

2017. (5) PEA and OAPSE jointly screened six out of seven Board of Education candidates in July 2017 and jointly endorsed three quality candidates. (6) In August PEA announced the three endorsed candidates at the district's opening day meeting.

It was time for the rubber to hit the road. Did PEA do enough to accomplish the three goals set forth by the membership? Did PEA earn enough trust in order for the membership to support PEA's three endorsed candidates? In summary over 300 PEA members donated over \$4,000 to the endorsed candidates' campaign, staffed three nights of phone banking made available by North Shore AFL-CIO, building representatives and Executive Committee members wrote 635 postcards to OEA members living in the local community requesting support of our endorsed candidates, approximately 100 members participated in knock-and-drops with campaign literature, 125 members placed yard signs in their front yards (we had more requests than signs!), and PEA members worked the polls on November 7 before and after their contracted work day. In short, all three PEA-endorsed candidates won in a land slide.

Upon reflection, the data from the listening tour was the key component. The data informed PEA leadership as to what the membership wanted from their association. I believe PEA's work over the prior two years built trust with members. As a result, approximately 500 members out of 775 members participated in one way or another to support PEA's endorsed candidates. This total doesn't include the members who simply had conversations with their family, friends, and neighbors.

I share this with you because the story in Parma is not unique. In fact PEA leadership was inspired by other locals who created positive change for their members by electing pro-public education candidates. With a functional Board and a new superintendent who fosters shared leadership, PEA believes educators and students will once again be valued and respected.

In education, the finish line is consistently moving. As one goal is met, another challenge arises. However, due to our successful grassroots efforts across the state, I am excited and hopeful this momentum will continue into the election season of 2018

Summary: NEOEA Representative Assembly November 11, 2017—Harding High School in Warren

The North Eastern Ohio Education Association held the fall meeting of its Representative Assembly at Warren G. Harding High School on Saturday, November 11.

The Representative Assembly (RA) is the top governing body of NEOEA, following a governance structure similar to the National Education Association and the Ohio Education Association, with which NEOEA is affiliated. Representation is proportional: each local is allotted at least two delegates at NEOEA's RA, and larger locals are allotted more delegates.

Each RA is a little different, and this one was no exception. Following a practice that has become more common in recent years, delegates met in a multipurpose room rather than a formal auditorium. The 255 delegates and 34 guests present were greeted by Jeff Pegg, President of the Warren Education Association, and Stacey Frederick, President of the Warren Secretarial Association. Warren City School District's Superintendent Steve Chiaro shared the positive steps all parties have taken over the past few years for the good of all employees.

Presiding at the third of the four RAs scheduled for his two-year term of office,

NEOEA President Jeff Wensing noted it was Veterans' Day and led delegates in honoring the service veterans present and then spoke about the need to elect local school board members who support public education and value the work of the employees in the district. Jeff shared his own local's experience and success in the recent round of elections.

In a fund-raiser conducted during the Legislative Committee's report at the Representative Assembly, delegates donated \$4,122 to OEA's Fund for Children and Public Education.

Jill Gunther and Jenn Schumm, striking Service and Support Administrators in Portage County, addressed the delegates. Their local has been on strike since October 4. Delegates passed the envelope and collected \$1,535 for the SSAs in Portage County.

At the recommendation of the Resolutions Committee, delegates enacted the NEOEA Resolutions for 2017-18. NEOEA's new resolutions document includes 171 statements setting forth Association principles on topics identified in the organization's Constitution. Delegates approved three new resolutions in section I, which consists of resolutions attempting to "promote and protect human and civil

rights": Institutional and Organizational Discrimination; Racial Justice; and Sexual Assault.

Delegates elected Sharon Callahan (Cardinal EA) to a fill vacancy for NEOEA Unit 6 Representative.

Each entry in the following report begins with the county, employer, local affiliate, service council, and OEA office. This is very brief summary of a rather complicated agreement; consult your OEA Labor Relations Consultant for more detailed information.

 Assn. (North Coast "C," Mentor). At the end of July the classified employees ratified a two-year contract with increases of 1.5% and 1%.
- Cuyahoga, Euclid City, Euclid Class.
 Trans. Assn. (North Coast "C,"
 Mentor). At the beginning of
 October the employees agreed to a
 three-year contract with average
 increases for drivers of 3%, 2.75%,
 and 2.7%; for van drivers of 0%,
 1.75%, and 1.75%; and for
 monitors of 3%, 4.25%, and 4.1%.
 Employees will maintain seniority
 and pay if they retire and continue
 working for First Student.
- Cuyahoga, Euclid City, Euclid TA

(North Coast "C," Mentor). At the end of August the teachers agreed to a two-year contract with increases of 1.5% each year.

- Mahoning, Boardman Local, Boardman EA (Tri-County, Boardman). At the end of June, the Boardman teachers ratified a threeyear agreement with increases of 1%, 2%, and 2%.
- Mahoning, Mahoning County CTC, Mahoning County CTC EA (Western Reserve, Boardman). At the end of August, the employees agreed to a three-year contract with increases of 2%, 1%, and 1%.
- Mahoning, Summit Academy, SAY EA (Tri-County, Boardman). At midnight on July 21—the day before the first staff workday for the 2017-18 year—the employees ratified a contract including fair share fee, bonus for employees based on years of employment, and union security for members.
- Mahoning, Youngstown State Univ., YSU Chapter of OEA (CASSY 43, Boardman). In mid-October the YSU-OEA employees ratified a

- three-year contract with increases of 2%, 2.5%, and 2.5%.
- Portage, Southeast Local, Southeast Local District TA (Unified Portage, Hudson). At the end of August, the teachers agreed to a three-year contract with increases of 2% each year plus the compression of the salary schedule (net increase of 4% to 7% depending on placement) and two longevity steps.
- Portage, Southeast Local, Southeast Local SSPA (Unified Portage, Hudson). At the beginning of August the classified employees ratified a two-year contract with increases of 2% each year.
- Summit, Hudson Local, Hudson EA (Summit/Portage "A," Hudson). In mid-May the Hudson educators ratified a three-year contract with increases of 2% each year plus steps.
- Summit, Tallmadge City, Tallmadge TA (Summit/Portage "B," Hudson).
 The Tallmadge teachers agreed to a three-year contract with increases of 1% each year plus one step recovery each year.

Representative Assembly Honors Leading Locals

In 2001, NEOEA's Public Relations Committee and Executive Committee created the "Five Star Local Award" to recognize local affiliates that set an example of engagement with the Association at large.

In order to win the award, local affiliates participated in a variety of activities offered by NEOEA and the Ohio Education Association. Those activities involved:

- professional and leadership training for local members;
- accessing resources provided to the local affiliate by the larger organization;

- **9E, Should You Take Your LumpS ... um?** Soon-to-be retirees may elect to participate in the Partial Lump-Sum Option Plan (PLOP) at retirement by taking a portion of their benefit as a lump-sum cash payment or rollover. This session will help you understand the mechanics of the STRS Ohio PLOP and how it may affect your financial picture in the future.
- **9F, Step Away from the Phone**: Do you want your phone confiscated as evidence? Did you ever think you might be taking a sledgehammer to your laptop? Learn the dos and don'ts of operating responsible social media accounts.
- **9-10G, Show Me the Money—General Fund Analysis (double session):** Do you believe your members deserve a raise? Does your school district believe the same? Do local treasurers have too much money in frivolous accounts? Find out where the money is in your district!
- **9H, Don't Ask, We'll Tell! Understanding and Protecting the Rights of the LGBTQ+ Community:** Learn about current issues in the LGBTQ+ community including anti-discrimination legislation and policies. We will discuss ways for educators to be inclusive within their classrooms and tear down sexual orientation and gender identity barriers.
- 9 I, Connect with the State School Board: Ohio's State Board of Education has received more attention recently than in previous years. We've invited all four of northeastern Ohio's elected State Board of Education members to join us and share their experiences on the Board and their impressions of the current issues faced by the Board. OEA's Vice President Scott DiMauro will facilitate the conversation.
- 9J, SUN—Straight Up Negotiating: Imagine resolving your economic issues in hours—not days or weeks! Imagine grouping your noneconomic issues and generating more durable resolutions. Come see a highly-innovative model for bargaining presented by a representative from the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service (FMCS).
- **9K, Reacting to an Active Shooter:** Many of us have had lockdown training and drills. Lt. Jeff Shelton from the Wellington Police Department will tell participants what else they need to know—no matter what your title is in a school. Learn the positive reasons to allow students to carry cell phones.
- 9-10L, Building Cultural Competence (double session): Ask anyone if they're prejudiced, and their response will be "no"—that they're forward thinkers without bias. But we all have biases: some based on fear of the unknown, some on traumatizing experiences, others are culturally ingrained, and yet others are so subtle we don't know they exist. Everyone has biases, whether they are aware of them or not. Participants will discuss the relevance of implicit bias and its damaging effects on academic achievement.

10:00-10:50 SESSIONS

10A, The New Google Sites: Learn how to use the brand-new version of Google Sites which is used to make a classroom website including a welcome page, calendar page, files page, links page, pictures page, and more. Users are encouraged to bring their devices. Targeted Audience: All Educators with a basic understanding of Google.

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- 10B, Breaking News—OPERS Update: An update on what is happening with the retirement system that serves many DD and some ESP members. Information on service retirement benefits, recent changes to the system's structure as it relates to eligibility, retired member benefits, and proposed changes to the system that are headed to the Ohio legislature.
- 10C, Thinking and Writing for EdTPA and RESA: Style Does Matter! The EdTPA and the Resident Educator Summative Assessment (RESA) are performance assessments that require candidates to demonstrate their knowledge and skills, as revealed in their day-to-day teaching. Pre-service and early-career educators are required to analyze and reflect about their teaching, and then write about their teaching practice. During this session, participants will learn to think and write in descriptive, analytic, and reflective ways to prepare for their submissions. Style does matter!
- 10D, INFOhio: This hands-on session will introduce you to the free 24x7 access to quality information resources available to your students from school or home. Explore electronic versions of magazines, newspapers, encyclopedias, websites, media assets, and more. Many can be incorporated into content management systems, and most respond to the standards-based need to integrate literary nonfiction across the curriculum. Use this time to identify resources to integrate into lessons. (Limited to 18 participants.)
- **10E, What's Up with STRS:** The latest information on how STRS Ohio is working to maintain system solvency and member benefits, recent changes towards those goals, and information of interest to active and retired members.
- **10F, Extra, Extra; Read All About It...Legal Updates:** What are the parameters for intellectual property? Are the plans, products, and projects you create for your classroom really yours? What can you legally take with you or sell on line? Learn your rights as educators!
- 9-10G, Show Me the Money—General Fund Analysis (continues from 9:00 session)
- 10-11H, Bargaining with Backbone—Preparing for Bargaining (double session): Do you need straight up information about the ins and outs of bargaining? Are you set and ready for successful bargaining? Prepare your team for bargaining: go in strong and get your members what they deserve!
- 10 I, What the Heck is OEA? This session is designed to show attendees the organizational framework of OEA including graphic organizers to illustrate the inner workings of how the OEA governs and to guide you on how to be a viable force in your Association.
- 10J, Janus v. AFSCME...In Your Face Janus! The Supreme Court may rule in favor of Right To Work for the entire nation. What does this mean for you as an OEA member? How can we ensure membership engagement? Your Union needs you! Participants will determine what role they will play in strengthening their local through building relationships and showing members the value of their Union.
- 10K, Opiate Abuse and Recovery Help: Ohio is on the front line of America's heroin epidemic. Lt. Jeff Shelton from the Wellington Police Department is trying to fight the deadly effects with the LINC program—Local Initiative Networking Compassion. The success rate is very high for recovery and has shown positive results in the community. Learn how educators can make themselves aware of the issues in our schools.
- 9-10L, Building Cultural Competence (continues from 9:00 session)

11:00-11:50 SESSIONS

- 11A, DIY Space in Your School (Makerspace): This session will provide an overview of a Makerspace—a place where students can learn and use new technologies and equipment they may otherwise not have access to. The presenter will also show participants how to start a Makerspace in their building.
- 11B, Conducting an Assessment Audit: How to Collect the Data to Start the Conversation and Get the Right Tools: Despite federal flexibility, Ohio continues to require a large number of required assessments. Coupled with districts' increased spending on commercial vendors, teachers are not receiving the data which informs instruction. Learn how to conduct a simple assessment audit, collect data, and begin the local conversation.
- 11C, Millennial Financial Magic: No need to pull a rabbit out of the hat. Having a secure financial future is real (even with our wages), and you can deliver a big outcome with just a few small tweaks in your daily or weekly habits. Members can learn the basics of financial planning fundamentals in this session.
- 11D, Digital Literacy: WVIZ/PBS ideastream® offers PBS LearningMedia, a free online streaming service. This session will overview the curricular website, and each participant will establish a free account. Hands-on time will be provided. Includes short videos, audio clips, images, digital documents, interactive media, curricular collections, clip art, lesson plans, and more. Search by keyword, subject, grade level, and/or standards. (Limited to 18 participants.)
- 11E, Speaking of SERS—Know Your Future: An update on what is going on with the retirement system that serves many Education Support Professionals—its destiny, system health, issues, and changes that will affect members. An outlook for the future will be presented by an Associate from SERS.
- **11F**, Make Less Waste: Educators will learn how to develop a waste-free classroom and alter the current throw-away culture. Kathleen Rocco from the Cuyahoga County Solid Waste District will teach participants what they can recycle and compost as well as share activities and resources.
- **11G, Somebody's Watching You:** Protecting your identity, with the many recent events in the news, can feel like an impossibility. However, there are several steps, procedures, and strategies that you can use to avoid scams and the takeover of who you are. This session will provide help in building a defense or working damage control when a breach has occurred.
- 10-11H, Bargaining with Backbone—Preparing for Bargaining (continues from 10:00 session)
- 11 I, Loot for Locals 2.0: Through your Association's affiliation with NEOEA, OEA, and NEA, you can make your dues dollars work for you! This session will present tried and true ideas for NEOEA grants that have been winners as well as hear about OEA grants you can apply for. Available to K-12, Higher Ed., ESP, and DD.
- 11J, Wrapping Your Head around RESA: This session will provide an overview of Ohio's recently revised Four-Year Residency Program including the focused mentoring requirements that will be implemented and scored at the local level.
- 11K, Lobbying Is Not a Dirty Word When You Do It with Friends: The time to influence change is now. This session will provide on-the-spot lobbying training and skills. Learn how to craft a message that will influence your legislators. This session will be an exciting look into the world of lobbying. Users are encouraged to bring their devices.
- 11L, Restorative Justice: An Introduction: What is Restorative Justice and how can your district use Restorative Practices to improve school climate and reduce discipline disparities? We will explore the continuum of Restorative Practices (what it is and what it isn't), current district policies, how the union can advocate for students and educators, build relationships, and create community in schools to prevent and to repair harm.
